Think Alouds	Reading Strategy
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • I think this word means... I'll check it in the dictionary. • This word has the root... • What does this word mean? Can I use it in this way? • This word must have something to do with size. I could check to see if the Glossary helps me check the meaning. 	<p>Consulting a Reference</p>
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • When I read these words I grouped them together. That's because they go together in a phrase. • I made my voice go slightly up at the end of that sentence. • That's because the author has put a question mark there. • I meant to say that word loudly because the author has put it in bold type so he wants me to emphasise this word. 	<p>Phrasing, Punctuation, Typographical aids – (bold type, italics)</p>
